Trinity River Paddling Trail



The Trinity River Paddling Trail consists of 130 miles of river accessed by 21 official launch sites. The paddling trail traverses 9 municipalities including Dallas and Ft. Worth, and is located in the middle of America's 4th largest metro area with a population of 7.5 million people. Over 5 million people live within 30 minute drive of the trail.



Paddling Trail Status August 2022

- Currently 20 out of 21 launch sites are open.
 - Two launch sites are getting difficult to use.
- ► All but 2 sections are 4-6 mile in length
 - One 12 mile section
 - One 24 mile section
- Plans are in the works for three new launch sites
 - Beltline Rd. in Grand Prairie
 - Veridian Lake Development in Arlington
 - Riverside Park in Fort Worth

Paddling Trail Usage May 2022

- Trinity River National Water Trail
 - The trail has been usable all of this year so far with the exception of one day in April and approximately 3 weeks in May and June.
 - All sections are clear and passable of any downed trees and log jams.
 - I recently paddled down from LLELA and did not experience any trees blocking the river.
 - We can usually count on one tree partially blocking the river
 - One large trash jam has not yet been cleared.
 - It is located at the mouth of Joe's Creek and the Elm
 - The Dallas Downriver Club is planning a river race on September 17th at McInnish Park

Trail Section Location: River Legacy Park, Arlington, TX. Collins Street entrance: 3020 N. Collins St., Arlington, TX 76006. Latitude / Longitude DD: 32.788243° -97.100328°

Directions to Trail:

Take the Collins St exit off I-30. Turn North on Collins St. Continue North on Collins St.

The entrance to the Park will be on your left after Green Oaks Blvd.

Launch Parking and ramp is on your left ~1000ft from the park entrance.


Launch Description: Long gentle slope to a concrete boat ramp.

Distance and Take-out: 24 miles, the take-out is Trammell Crow Park.

Trail Description: The put-in is boat ramp at River Legacy Park. This is a winding river with moving water - some small rapids & riffles. Mostly gravel bottom. The take out is a concrete boat ramp. River Gauge:







Our three crews contracted with the City of Fort Worth Code Compliance: Solid Waste ServiceDepartment have realized a 264% increase in citywide miles cleaned since the start of the contract in 2018.

Prior to UpSpire's start, 94 miles on average were being abated per month compared to our current average of 342 miles/month.



1,308

1,308 curb miles are cleaned of trash per month.

That's the distance from Dallas to New York City



70.9







 - Listed for nutrient concerns (nitrates, chlorophyll-a)
- Village Creek
 - 303(d) list for *E. coli* impairment
 - Additional entities involved

Lake Arlington Illegal Dumping/Refuse Accumulation Survey 2018




Installing Trash Barriers in VCLA and Fort Worth Parks
