Overview

The Program: "The DMCSP is designed to support long-term community investments that strengthen national security innovation and expand the capabilities of the defense industrial ecosystem."


Split into two phases: first phase is receiving designation; second phase is pursuing grant funding for projects.

Lead Organization: North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) submitted the application as the Lead Organization on behalf of a broad and diverse group of defense manufacturers and supporting suppliers, workforce, and educational network in North Texas seeking designation by the Department of Defense as a Defense Manufacturing Community.

The 12-county region (right) serves as the **project** area and service region for this proposal.

North Texas Defense Manufacturing Consortium

The Proposal: The North Texas Defense Manufacturing Consortium (NTDMC)—an association of defense industry firms, economic development and workforce development groups, universities and community colleges, and the North Central Texas Council of Governments and Metropolitan Planning Organization—seeks to increase the resiliency of the manufacturing and defense industrial base supply chains, specifically within the aerospace and aviation segment.

The Consortium will accomplish this through activities specifically geared towards closing identified gaps in the current aerospace manufacturing sector in North Texas, making improvements in supply chain cybersecurity, supply chain visibility/optimization, supplier business diversification, development of software engineering talent, and R&D research capability.

The scope of this program includes five primary tasks, encompassing six specific projects.

Project Tasks:

- Workforce Skills Development
 Industry-Community College Partnership
 Industry-University Partnership
- 2. Supply Chain Cybersecurity
- 3. Supply Chain Visibility and Optimization
- Defense Sole-Source Supplier Conversion to Dual-Markets
- 5. Defense Modernization Applied Research

Budget: \$5 million requested, plus local contributions.

Texas Comptroller Report on Economic Impact of Military Bases

NAS JRB Fort Worth Regional Coordination Committee July 20, 2020

Report Overview

Texas Military Preparedness Commission requested a report from the Comptroller's office analyzing the impact of US military installations on the state economy.

15 military installations and the US Army Futures Command are located in Texas.

Report includes active duty, visiting, other military personnel, dependents, civilian employees, and contractors directly affiliated with bases.



87th Legislative Position Development

Previous RCC Legislative Positions

Session	RCC Position	Actions and Outcomes
86 th Legislative Session 2019	 Promotes compatible growth and provides cities and counties enhanced options to manage growth near military installations and within training areas Promotes compatible development and minimizes encroachment through the following tools: Creating effective methods to initiate dialogue between project developers, military bases, and City, County, and State Officials prior to development for proposed activities (e.g. wind turbines, communications towers, sensitive land uses, lighting, etc.) that may affect military operations; Expanding communication efforts to inform current and potential residents or tenants of new construction residential, multifamily, and commercial development who may be affected by military operations; Adding military installations and training areas and adjacent land to the list of restricted areas for UAS operation per Texas Government Code Sec. 423; Supporting collaboration between local governments, state, and the Federal Aviation Administration to advance regulations to ensure safe operations of unmanned aircraft vehicles. Made significant progress but failed to pass. Passage, then Veto of HB 3082 (Murphy): Bill related to penalties for UAS flights over critical infrastructure; was amended to include SB 2299.

87th Legislative Position Development

Draft RCC Legislative Program

- The RCC supports legislation that promotes compatible growth and provides cities and counties enhanced options to manage growth near military installations and within training areas.
- The RCC seeks legislation which promotes compatible development and quality of life, as well as, minimizes encroachment through the following tools:
 - Creating effective methods to initiate dialogue between project developers, military bases, and City, County, and State Officials prior to development for proposed activities (e.g., wind turbines, communications towers, sensitive land uses, lighting, etc.) that may affect military operations;

- Supporting continued funding for the DEAAG program;
- Expanding real estate disclosure near military installation requirements to include new residential construction, residential leases, and commercial properties

Joint Land Use Study Implementation Grant Update

Overview

- Joining Forces study completed in 2018
- Over 150 strategies identified, both regional and installation-specific
- JLUS Implementation Grant has been submitted, scope of work approved
- Targeting August 2020 for grant agreement, complete by February 2022
- Approximately \$460,000 federal grant + \$50,000 local match (RTC local funds provided by NCTCOG) – Total \$510,000 effort
- Additional local funding is available to continue implementation efforts past the federal grant and work on items not eligible for funding through DOD
- Covers NAS JRB Fort Worth, Fort Wolters, Dallas Army Aviation Support Facility, Camp Maxey and regional strategies

Grant Scope of Work

- Coordination between military and the community
- Local planning and encroachment protection
- Sound attenuation measures
- Aviation issues
- Infrastructure improvements
- Perimeter security partnerships
- Public information
- Final report

Initial NAS JRB Fort Worth Related Tasks

- Convene regional forum
- Enhance RCC development review tool
- Investigate sound attenuation incentive program, connecting homeowners with existing weatherization resources
- Investigate regional noise complaint clearinghouse
- Communication effort related to real estate disclosure
- Engage other Texas communities involved with JLUS projects or implementation

- Initiate alliance between County Judges, military installations and defense contractors



☐ F-35 EIS Process

- Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC) continues work
- Next action, Security and Policy review, AFRC
- Followed by publish EIS responses to Federal Resister mid-August
- Expect final EIS document to Secretary of the Air Force for Record of Decision (ROD) by 30 September 2020.
- AFRC team received a total of 480 comments (mostly noise) from the four cites.
- Fort Worth submitted (or voiced) 81 comments. Of those, 67 were in support.

- United States Space Force, the Department of the Air Force, in coordination with the Office of Secretary of Defense, in May announced a revised approach for determining a permanent location of U.S. Space Command headquarters.
- Screening Criteria
- Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) top 150 largest MSA
- Proximity to a Military Base 25 miles
- Livability Index AARP index above 50

Evaluation Criteria

- Mission Related (40 points) —available qualified workforce, proximity to supporting space entities, provide emergency and incident response requirements, and enable mobility.
- Infrastructure Capacity (30 points) facility and parking space, communications
 bandwidth and redundancy, special access communications, anti-terrorism, force
 protection (AT/FP) and security requirements, energy resilience, and nearby active
 duty installation with support to service members to include medical care, childcare,
 military housing, and transportation.

Evaluation Criteria

- Community Support (15 points) –Support to military families as measured by the quality of schools, professional licensure portability, cost of living, housing affordability, and access to military/veteran support programs
- Costs to the Department of the Air Force (15 points) One-time infrastructure and transportations costs, area construction cost factor, basic housing allowance rate, and area locality pay.

Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grant (DEAAG)

Status

- Renovation of former Omni Bank building
- Consolidation of Navy Campus and Fleet and Facility Support Center
- DEAAG partners, State of Texas / City of Fort Worth
- Grant team decision to submit second round / second half of 2020
- Navy awards \$488,000 design contract price estimate factors
- Expect plans to submit October December 2020
- Awards announced early 2021 for remaining State funds, \$15 million

Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grant (DEAAG)

Status

The following entities will receive FY2020-2021 DEAAG disbursements:

Abilene – \$616,389; <u>Security</u> Control Center expansion at Dyess Air Force Base brings additional capacity to the security center

Alamo Area Council of Governments – \$5,000,000; Project reinforces and hardens <u>power</u> distribution across San Antonio and Joint Base San Antonio

Corpus Christi – \$919,500; Flight line <u>security</u> and safety enhancements at Corpus Christi Army Depot

El Paso – \$2,050,000; Expansion of the Kay Bailey Hutchison Desalination Plant, serving El Paso and Fort Bliss - <u>water</u>

Texarkana – \$516,670; Robotic Vehicle Program preparing Red River Army Depot for the Army's new robotics mission – <u>technology</u>

Tom Green County – \$5,000,000; Project Resiliency funds <u>power</u> infrastructure, human resiliency and communications infrastructure, benefiting San Angelo and Goodfellow Air Force Base




Meandering Road
